### Pastor's Message - His Eye is on the Sparrow

The morning of Confirmation Sunday Mark was walking Diesel before church. He spotted a small bird at the base of a utility pole and felt it was his duty to help this poor creature of God. He put the bird in a shoe box in the garage and headed to church. After church his mission was to care for this small bird, he named Little Bit. Between him and our neighbor, Yafa, who is a biology teacher, he found out that because the bird is a sparrow, (considered invasive species) wildlife centers will not take them. He did find a lady in Fort Salonga who cares for wild birds, who agreed to care for the bird but not until 6:00 pm.

The rest of the day, Mark continued to investigate what to feed Little Bit. With the small syringe-type dropper Yafa brought over, and holding the bird in his hand, Mark alternated between water and soggy dog food and Little Bit responded. (Diesel, by the way, was uninterested and a little annoyed his Dad isn't paying attention to him).

Mark does acknowledge that God may have intended the bird to be a snack for a raccoon or a cat...but he doesn't think he was upsetting nature by intervening. My role was to continue to take pictures and videos of Mark and Little Bit, which I did faithfully.

On his way to Fort Salonga, Mark stopped at a pet store and bought meal worms. Both Mark and Little Bit initially thought these worms were awful but mixing them with the water Little Bit devoured them. The rest of the trip Little Bit serenaded Mark in the seat next to him in the makeshift nest Mark created.

As Mark pulled up to the house, he noticed six deer were grazing in the front yard. Mark met the lady and learned that she cares for stranded creatures. They exchange information and she promised to send updates and in turn Mark donated to the Little Bit Endowment. Later that night, there was a picture of Little Bit and other small sparrows with their mouths open waiting for food. Little Bit looked content and at home.

This reminded me of the story read earlier in church, The Good Samaritan. Mark cared for a small bird that is considered 'not indigenous or native and can cause great economic and environmental harm to the environment'.

Despite that, Mark spent his time caring for this little creature. After taking him to his temporary home, Mark left money for his care.

I wonder if the sparrow has always been considered an invasive species and if that is the meaning behind the hymn: His eye is on the sparrow, and I know he watches me.

Maybe instead of being a snack for a raccoon or cat, the intention was for us humans who have become so busy finishing one task to get to the other, to stop and notice life around us. Our whole family got engaged in the story and yes, when Mark updated Yafa that Little Bit was in a good place, she and her family also rejoiced.

I sing because I'm happy, I sing because I'm free, for his eye is on the sparrow, and I know he watches me.

Remember that if God is watching an unwanted bird, surely God is watching us.

### **Church Reflections from Rev. Lynn Sullivan**

It has not sunk in that my time here is coming to an end. I cannot express enough how blessed I was to be able to serve you in the many roles I had here. I thought it would be interesting to be reminded of a few historical facts of this church.

Of the ten Senior Pastors, the shortest tenure was the first pastor, John Snyder serving one year. The longest was Jim Adelmann, serving 26 years. Taking out Jim's time here, the average time for a pastor was seven years. In addition, this church has had 27 'other' clergy and 12 music ministers. Only three of the 'other' clergy went on to serve as Senior Pastor. They are Rev. Dr. Jim Gettemy, Rev. Jim Adelmann and me.

In the mid 1920's, a survey was conducted to determine if Protestant families living in Garden City would be interested in another mainline Protestant congregation other than the Episcopal Church.

In 1927 the Nassau Boulevard area of Garden City was assigned to the Reform Church of America but they were unable to finance a new church. In 1928 the Western area of Garden City was assigned to the Presbyterian Church of North America and the Nassau Boulevard "Estates" section was assigned to the Congregationalists, which ultimately became the Garden City Community Church.

The first morning worship service was held on October 20, 1929 at a private home on Nassau Boulevard. After the Easter Service, April 20, 1930, fifty people signed the charter.

In the 93 years of existence, this church has had its ups and downs along with the current events of the times. Jane Nelson recently shared, "The sixties were a challenging time for this church coming out of a disastrous group ministry team. What kept us going was the choir, and the choir director."

At the 1935 Annual meeting of the Garden City Community Church, the church treasurer reported \$75.60 in the congregation's general fund and \$51.72 in the building fund. The following year, the congregation was so short of men available to hold church offices, that they took the controversial step and elected women to the Board of Trustees.

Reading the History of The Garden City Community Church, compiled by Dr. Barry Keating and Suzie Alvey for the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the church, this church weathered many storms and grew because of the spirit of the members. No doubt we will need to add the pandemic to the list of historical facts and how the tech team stepped up to bring church to the people.

Many of our current members grew up in the church, raised their children in this church and have a vested interest in keeping this church relevant and vital. For those reasons I am confident this church will continue to be a pillar of this community. Later in this newsletter you will see guidelines for the church and pastor in a healthy, faithful departure. You will all remain in my heart forever.



### **Chase Palmer**



# UCC Guidelines for an Ethical Departure, taken from A Sure Foundation Booklet, a resource for the relationship between pastors and congregations.

Below are excerpts taken from this booklet. Church leaders have the Sure Foundation Booklet for the entire chapter on departing guidelines.

Theological grounding: Every ministry has a beginning and an end. Moses and Elijah concluded their earthly ministries entrusting their authority to others and believing that God would provide other leaders who could carry on the work of ministry and leadership to that community. This trust in God is essential at the time of departure, when the reality of the new boundaries becomes real and the temptations to cross those boundaries increase.

<u>Boundaries and best practices:</u> It is the expectation that, upon departure, a pastor will not return to serve the congregation or its congregants in a pastoral capacity. This boundary enables the pastor to fulfill UCC Ministerial Code in support of their former church's relationship-building with a new pastor.

The pastor will no longer be available to the congregation or affiliated persons for weddings, baptisms, funerals, church activities, pastoral care, etc.

The pastor must be consistent with all congregants in unfriending/unfollowing them from social media outlets.

The final service is a combined service of gratitude and dismissal of both the church and pastor.

While this seems harsh, this is an important discipline for the departing pastor and congregation to adhere to these guidelines for both to transition in a healthy manner. Clergy have shared that it is an emotional time to 'unfriend' members and used it as a time of personal prayer of gratitude for the gifts they have shared over the years. This truly is a time to allow God in and trust that God will guide us in making all things new.

### Start Your Day With Self-Care

During these trying times, when the world seems so out of control, it can be helpful to focus on things that are in your control to make your days better. Here are some helpful tips:

- 1. Start your day an hour earlier. This way your circadian rhythm is in sync (as you should try to wake up with the sun if you can, which will help you sleep better at night). An extra hour will help you set aside time for self-care. Tip: If needed, put your alarm clock/phone further away so that you have to get up to turn it off.
- 2. Drink a glass of water (or two). The benefits of water are endless. Water helps you lose weight by kick staring your metabolism, reduces inflammation in your body, boosts brain function, helps immunity, eliminates toxins, and nourishes your skin. Water also reduces fatigue and gives our bodies the natural energy that it needs. Hot water is also known to relieve stress and improve circulation.
- 3. Write down 3 things you are grateful for and thank God for them. Gratitude is a great way to boost your mood, focus on the good in your life, and make you aware of a different, better perspective. There is no better way to start your day than in prayer, asking Jesus for help, guidance, and strength.
- 4. Write down one goal that you would like to accomplish today. We often try to accomplish more than is realistic. Keep your goal short and manageable, so that when you complete it you feel a sense of accomplishment and pride. It can be something as small as getting your laundry done or making a phone call to a friend to catch up.
- 5. Meditating for 10-30 minutes will help your automatic nervous system feel centered and calm, slowing you down so you can stay in the moment and set intention. You can find morning meditations on You Tube, or use the app *Headspace*, or *Calm*.
- 6. Stretching exercises, light yoga or pilates practiced for just 10-20 minutes is a great way to help stiff joints and inflammation, making you feel lighter and in less pain. "Calm body=Calm mind". The mind-body connection must be balanced for you to feel your best.
- 7. Exercise-- even a short 10 minute walk will do. This gets your body and mind ready to start the day, and also gives you a boost of energy and serotonin (the 'feel-good' neurotransmitters our body needs for pleasure).
- 8. Eat a healthy breakfast. What we put into our body greatly impacts how we feel. Don't skip breakfast as this can cause blood sugar levels to drop which can cause spirts of anxiety throughout the day.
- 9. Read the Bible, devotions, prayers, or spend time reading a chapter in a book or magazine you enjoy. If there's no time, audible books are always a great option.
- 10.Plan your day. It will help you feel in control, focused and on top of things.
- 11. Take a shower, get dressed, and start your day!
